VOTER ENGAGEMENT WEEK SEPTEMBER 14 - 18, 2020

Soror Niea Gardner was appointed to be the Hawaii State Coordinator within the Far Western Connection Committee of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated. The 2020 Census and 2020 General Elections are two crucial and categorical imperatives within our community which face additional challenges due to social distancing restrictions imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Without hesitation, Soror Niea led the Connection Committee and Lambda Chi Omega to deploy our AKAs L.E.A.D. Get Out The Vote (GOTV) program and Census 2020 responses. To combat the increasing concerns of voter suppression, a Voter Engagement Week was held on September 14-18, 2020 to elevate the power of the black vote. As we approach the 100 Day Countdown to Decision 2020, the Connection Committee continues to implement strategies to increase voter participation and integrate virtual mobilization strategies into chapter operations and activities. We invite chapter members to share creative and innovative ways to increase voter registration by 25,000 in 2020. The Lambda Chi Omega Chapter AKA Connection Committee members also include Soror Michelle Dewberry, Soror Tam Reed and Ex-Officio Soror Letitia Bryant. Together, with the assistance of our GOTV partners, we will educate, register, mobilize and lead our community to the polls on November 3rd.



BREAST CANCER AWARENESS VEHICLE PARADE & ONLINE RALLY

The Pink Power Pearls are gearing up for the FIRST VIRTUAL Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure in October 2020! Member LaTonya Conkleton and two of our chapter's breast cancer survivors, Michelle Dewberry and Krista Ray, kicked off this year's efforts on August 1, 2020 in a socially distanced, vehicle parade. Raising public awareness and encouraging early screening, hundreds of supporters decorated cars and drove from Kahala Mall to Kapiolani Park in Honolulu. In-person participation was limited due to health safety. Michelle Dewberry and chapter President, Letitia Bryant were featured in an online rally on September 10, 2020. Team members attended this virtual event along with others in the state to celebrate, honor and recognize top teams and sponsors.

The 2020 Team Captain for Pink Power Pearls is Soror Christel Thompson. They are off to a strong start in this year's race and have already surpassed its 2020 goal as well as last year's total giving. In fact, the Pink Power Pearls are leading the state of Hawai'i in monetary donations! All proceeds benefit the Susan G. Komen Foundation to provide funding for research and means to find a cure to end breast cancer. Beyond raising monetary donations, survivors in the chapter have been instrumental in educating the public by sharing their personal experiences with this deadly disease and the importance of early detection for prevention and treatment. 
HBCU IMPACT WEEK

SEPTEMBER 21 - 26, 2020

Bouquet of Tea Roses to Soror Sabrina Bradley and the HBCU Committee for spearheading an awesome HBCU Impact Week! Our community in Hawaii has developed a greater appreciation for Historically Black College and Universities and contributed financially to their sustainment. During the week and in coordination with local school counselors, chapter members held virtual HBCU information sessions with students across the state of Hawaii. These interactive sessions gave students opportunities to ask questions about student life, the application and admissions processes and alumnae campus experiences. Lambda Chi Omega partners with Leilehua and Radford High Schools as a liaison for HBCU admissions and information to bridge the gap between Hawaii's students and mainland schools.

Lambda Chi Omega Chapter is excited to share that for the THIRD year in a row, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated surpassed our goal of raising \$1 million in ONE day for HBCUs! In 2018, the sorority's 30th International President Dr. Glenda Glover set a four-year goal to raise \$10 million to establish and support endowments for HBCUs. Since then and in partnership with the Education Advancement Foundation, Alpha Kappa Alpha has established endowments and provided grants to 32 of 96 HBCUs in 2019. This year, a second round of 32 HBCUs and an additional 24 recipients will receive grants. When you think of servanthood, what comes to mind? Do you envision a person at the bottom of the totem pole performing a so-called "menial" task for someone else's benefit? If so, then you have the wrong impression. Servanthood is not about position or skill. Servanthood is about attitude. We've all encountered people in service positions with poor attitudes toward servanthood: the rude worker at the government agency or the waiter who can't be bothered with taking your order. Just as you can sense when a worker doesn't want to help people, you can easily detect whether someone has a servant's heart. When you encounter a worker who has the attitude of a servant leader, everything changes. The best leaders desire to serve others, not themselves. In the end, the extent of your influence and the quality of your relationships depends on the depth of your care for others. That's why it is so important for leaders to be willing to serve. Three habits of a servant leader:

- **1. Perform small acts of kindness.** They find ways today to do small things that show other people they care.
- **2. Learn to walk slowly through the crowd.** They make it a goal to connect with others.
- **3. Move into action.** They perform acts of service.

Albert Schweitzer wisely stated, "I don't know what your destiny will be, but one thing I know: The ones among you who will be really happy are those who have sought and found how to serve." If you want to be successful on the highest level, be willing to serve on the lowest. That's the best way to build relationships—and your leadership!

"HBCUs now, HBCUs tomorrow, #HBCU4LIFE!" Lambda Chi Omega Chapter President and Tuskegee University Alumna, Letitia Bryant punctuated the finale of a five-part series by chapter HBCU alumnae called "Love Letter to My HBCU" featured across social media platforms. Five chapter members highlighted their alma mater during HBCU Impact Week beginning with Soror Tam Reed of Tennessee State University, followed by Lakiesha Stanley of North Carolina A&T University, December Gross of Howard University and Christel Thompson of Florida A&M University. Members brought attention to these centers of excellence from their personal experiences in this special week which has been designated to honor and recognize Historically Black Colleges and Universities. These vignettes illustrated important contributions of HBCU alumni and sustains the legacy of HBCUs by educating younger generations of the role they played in shaping the world in which they live. Bryant added, "HBCUs were the original Wakanda. HBCUs were established out of necessity but still, today, are essential; we must and will sustain them." MISS HAWAII SEEKS JUNETEENTH LEGISLATION

HONOLULU, SEPTEMBER 1, 2020

The Lambda Chi Omega chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated proudly supports Miss Hawaii USA's coalition to make Juneteenth a state holiday in Hawai'i. Samantha Neyland, graduate of Moanalua High School in Honolulu, is the reigning and first African American to be crowned Miss Hawaii USA."As a state that prides itself on diversity and inclusivity, it is long overdue for the Hawaii Legislature to fully live out the Aloha spirit and stand with the 46 states that have chosen to make Juneteenth an annual day of remembrance and celebration." Neyland also adds in Miss News that a state calendar date will serve to better educate Hawaii's diverse youth on Black History while celebrating the importance of equality.

Many states and the District of Columbia celebrated Freedom Day this past June to commemorate the end of slavery in the United States; several states have approved paid leave for city employees. While the U.S. Congress has not approved a national holiday since 1983 when it honored Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., many lawmakers are working toward a change. Communities across Hawai'i have continued to honor this historic day through marches and festivals although Hawaii remains one of three states that does not designate Juneteenth as a state holiday. Miss Hawaii USA plans to change that and with strong advocates and community support, she will.
